United Nations Peacekeeping



More than 62,000 UN peacekeepers are currently deployed around the globe in some of the most fraught regions. They stand between civilians and the forces of violence, between crisis and peace. Their bravery and commitment exemplify the UN's mission "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war".

The UN's 11 current peacekeeping operations cost around \$6 billion a year, about a half percent of global military spending. UN Peacekeeping has a proven history of preventing conflict and atrocity crimes. Studies show that the presence of peacekeepers significantly reduces the risk of renewed warfare and the number of civilian deaths.

International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers

On this day, we remember the 4,370 UN peacekeepers from 120 nations who have lost their lives serving in the cause of peace. Of these, 106 were British. This International Day was first observed in 2003 on 29 May, the date in 1948 when the first peacekeeping mission began operations in Palestine.

About those we remember

Count Folke Bernadotte

He led the Swedish Red Cross expedition to German concentration camps in early 1945 and was credited with liberating thousands of prisoners from many countries. After the war, the United Nations appointed him its Mediator in Palestine. Shortly after he tabled his peace plan in 1948, he was assassinated in Jerusalem, becoming the first member of the United Nations staff to be killed in the line of duty.

Commandant René de Labarrière

The French officer, Commandant de Labarrière, serving as a Military Observer in Palestine in 1948, was killed by a landmine, becoming the first United Nations peacekeeper to lose his life.

The UK in UN Peacekeeping

Participating today are contingents from the Household Cavalry Regiment and Royal Scots Dragoon Guards, recently returned from UN peacekeeping operations. The UK currently contributes 268 troops, experts and observers to UN peacekeeping missions, and is the sixth largest financial contributor to peacekeeping deployments.

Band of the Royal Air Force College

Formed in 1920 at RAF Cranwell, the Band of the Royal Air Force College has forged a reputation of musical and military excellence. It performs nationwide throughout the year, raising funds for Service charities. The Band played at the Coronation of Their Majesties King Charles III and Queen Camilla and its Fanfare Trumpeters performed in the Honours of Scotland Service for Their Majesties. Alongside musical duties, RAF musicians regularly support RAF operations around the world and were deployed across the UK responding to the COVID-19 crisis.
