About those we remember:

Count Folke Bernadotte

Count Folke Bernadotte, head of the Swedish Red Cross during World War II, led a relief expedition to Germany, saving 30,000 concentration camp prisoners. Serving as the UN's mediator in Palestine, he was assassinated in Jerusalem in 1948, becoming the first member of United Nations Staff to be killed in the line of duty. The wreath will be laid by his grandson.

Commandant René de Labarrière

The French officer, Commandant de Labarrière, was the first United Nations peacekeeper to lose his life. Serving as a Military Observer in Palestine, he was killed by a landmine in 1948.

Dame Margaret Anstee

Serving the United Nations for over four decades (1952–93), Dame Margaret was the first woman to be appointed UN Under-Secretary-General, in 1987. She served as the Secretary-General's Special Representative to Angola and the first woman to head a UN peacekeeping mission. She maintained close links with her old school, the Chelmsford County High School for Girls and with the nearby Anglo-European School, both participating in today's ceremony.



About United Nations Peacekeeping



The UN's 112,000 peacekeepers operate in some of the most fraught regions across the globe. They stand between civilians and the forces of violence, between crisis and peace. Their bravery and commitment exemplify the UN's mission "to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war".

UN peacekeeping operations cost around \$7.7 billion a year which makes up around half a percent of global military spending. The UN's 16 missions have a proven record of conflict prevention, and various studies have shown that the presence of peacekeepers significantly reduces the risk of renewed warfare and that the more peacekeepers are, the fewer the civilian deaths*

International Day of United Nations Peacekeepers

3,553 UN peacekeepers from 119 nations have lost their lives; of these, 104 were British. The International Day was first observed in 2003 on 29 May, the date in 1948 when the first mission began operations in Palestine, to pay tribute to all those who died in the line of duty.

Peacekeeping and the UK

Once the largest contributor of troops to UN peacekeeping missions, the UK currently deploys around 720 peacekeepers: 380 in South Sudan (UK troops run a field hospital and engineering programme), 280 in Cyprus, and 60 acting as advisers in other missions, predominantly Somalia. The UK is the sixth largest financial contributor to peacekeeping.
